The war is not the worst that happened to us...

An open letter from Dragana, a refugee from Jaice, BiH, who presently lives in Rijeka with her family - a similar story to that of many who suffer from the consequences of the war.

It's January, cold wind is whistling outside, it's snowing and we haven't had heating for days because we're out of wood. We're waiting for welfare so we can get at least one cubic meter, I ask a few neighbors to borrow some wood but even they don't have any extra. Then a van comes and volunteers from «The Family», our second family, unload a van full of wood. I thank you, and I thank your mothers for bringing you into the world.

How many times do we say «thank you» these days? Rarely, if ever. Most people remember to call on God only when they're in trouble. Nobody knows His plan for us, but I can surely say that for me and my family, He has ordained this friendship with the volunteers from «The Family». If it wasn't for their help during the past three years, my family and I would have starved, not to speak of the moral and spiritual support they have been to us. I'm fifty-five years old. I suf-

fer from a serious autoimmune disease and three more chronic conditions but I don't give up because there are always those who are worse off than I. Three years ago my husband had two cancerous tumors, and with all the consequences and side effects of treatment. he lives from day to day, nobody knows how long. It's a medical phenomenon that he's still alive!

Love is what feeds our soul and helps us to go on, the love that our close friends give us. Nothing bad ever happens without a reason. and there is a reason why during the war we had to run away and come here to Rijeka. We waited for my husband's pension for two vears - the rent, bills, medicine and food be-



came a big financial burden for us. The long-awaited pension finally came, and turned into a nightmare, as banks started taking off a third of it to cover loans. And again we didn't have enough for rent and bills. But we have food to eat, and love to lean on.

I hear complaints incessantly these days - that people have become cold and selfish, that nobody wants to help one another any more. Yet I'm still an optimist: because of that, people either envy me, or think I'm crazy. Tell me, after reading this letter, am I right or not to be optimistic? I am, because I know that there are and there will always be good people, of different nationalities and varied ages. My friends share with us whatever we ask them for, even though they themselves are full-time volunteers. I've also witnessed their interaction with people in another setting: they're miracle-workers when they go to visit terminal, old or abandoned patients, when they perform or organize workshops and seminars. You can feel their love and unselfishness everywhere. I want to thank also my friend Erika for bringing this new family to me, and I thank those who help and support their work. I will not write anymore about them, their noble hearts and kindness, because whoever reads this should seek them out and meet them. You will all receive a large measure of love, positivity, spiritual and moral energy. I know that Jesus is proud of them.

Thank you, and may His mercy be with you always.

Against all Odds!

Most of you would probably recall the article about my boys in Dom za odgoj (institution for delinquent minors in Rijeka) where I started working two years ago, after volunteering there for 5 years. I have always had a desire to work with the young (ever since I was young!), and in recent years have been involved with children every day in my association «Koraci». Yet I couldn't have ever imagined how much satisfaction I would get out of working with these young «problem cases».

When I think of my first days in Dom,

and especially of the times when some children were destructive and aggressive, everything good that has been accomplished since seems unreal. I'd often thought, am I overextending myself? Would I be able to carry this big load, and would I be able to change anything at all? With great enthusiasm, together with my colleagues. I started improving the living quarters of the children – their bedrooms. living room, school rooms, hallway, stairs and outside garden area. Whatever we were able to do one day, would already be destroyed the next day, burned or thrown out into the yard. I would come to work in the morning to find a pile of books ripped apart, burned decorations, scraped picture frames, pieces of broken flower pots and lifeless plants. The decorative wreaths hanging on the door of my office never survived till the next morning. I was often discouraged, but with the help of my colleagues, especially the cleaning ladies, and by developing a special relationship with the children, things began to change.

Nowadays, the shelves of our living room are full of books, interesting magazines, and even beautiful ceramic creations of the children themselves. In every room there are many flowers and the kids don't rip them apart any more, neither do they throw them out in the yard. Even more, they come to my art workshop room, which has become a little botanical garden, asking me for a plant to keep in their room. The once cold and awe-inspiring walls of our big hallways have become a world of children's drawings, ceramic creations and beautiful lively murals painted by volunteers from «The Family». Everything breathes with child-like freshness and joy. The staircase hallway is also decorated with educational posters, flowerpots and knick-knacks that add to the cozy feeling of «home». All summer long we worked on the



garden and outside area. Many hardworking hands of Italian volunteers toiled tirelessly to give a new look to the garden, which will take its final shape during the coming spring and summer of this vear.

The changes are felt not only on the

outside, but also in the atmosphere of the whole place, and more importantly, in the behavior of the children. They still have their «moments». but now vandalizing acts are rare. Unity and respect between children and caretakers are becoming stronger. I dare say that I await with joy every new day, watching the children wake up, get ready for breakfast, talk about the happenings of previous days, or simply sit down sleepily yawning and trying to find an excuse to

stav home from school. Nowadays, there is warmth in our conversations together. There is trust, respect and friendship. and to nourish that friendship. we need patience, understanding and forgiveness.

And we need to keep going forward! This year, there are new activities and projects that. I deeply believe, will strengthen our bond and convince our boys that we're not policemen or enemies, but friends whom they can lean on and with whom they

can share a great deal of their problematic growth into adulthood. We'll talk more about that in an upcoming newsletter; until then, many warm greetings to you all, and thank you for the help you've been to us!

Thanks to the colorful and lively illustrations of the "Grandpa Jake" book series, this month the children in the orphanage of Lovran received a surprise gift package: new murals on the walls of their bedrooms and outside in their play area. What a thrill to see the children jumping up and down and to hear their squeals of joy when, returning from a day out in the snow, they

saw the "new friends" on their walls!





We organized 48 shows/clown therapy events for a combined audience of over 6000 - kinder gardens, schools, senior citizens' homes, prisons, handicapped centers, hospitals, town squares and the soup kitchen.



▲ We held 5 seminars. 3 in Croatia and 2 abroad (in Romania and Albania), as well as many Sunday fellowship and inspirational get-togethers.



During our visits to needy families and institutions in Rijeka. Karlovac and BiH. we distributed more than 1000 kg of food, 208 boxes of clothes, shoes and linen, gym equipment, household & kitchen needs. baby needs and school supplies.



▲ We organized "Free hugs" 5 times together with young people from Rijeka, had a counseling presence at EXIT rock festival in Novi Sad, performed in "Palach" (Rijeka), and spent many hours in personal counseling.



▲ 2 volunteer training camps were held in the summer for 24 attendees. while a stream of part-time volunteers flowed through our community from the end of June till the end of August We worked to improve the living conditions of different institutions: "Dom za > odgoj" (for delinguent minors in Rijeka), Psychiatric hospital (Rab), Dom Turnic (for mentally ill senior citizens in Rijeka), Udruga "Koraci" (association offering creative ways of using children's and senior citizens' free time), Dom za djecu (Orphanage) in Lovran.





◆ At Christmas

Our show troupe performed altogether 56 times: 10 senior citizens' homes, 10 schools, 5 kinder gardens, 4 orphanages, 4 churches, 3 prisons, 2 hospitals, 2 centers for the handicapped etc.

Tired of Helping Others?

Interview with Andrea

Tell us a little bit about your calling in life and the time you spent in Croatia.

Before I met Jesus and became a volunteer. I worked at different jobs, looked for satisfaction in material things, tried drugs. alcohol and Satanism. I always felt that there was something more to life than working at a job, having your own house, growing vour roots somewhere and settling down. One day when I was totally down, I pleaded with Jesus, "If You really exist, please give meaning to my life!" A few days later, an old lady asked me for help to cross the street. There were no cars on that quiet morning in my small town, yet she asked me to help her. After I helped her cross, she thanked me with a beautiful smile and love in her eves. I still carry that smile in my heart today, and when I think about it, it still makes me happy. Through her Jesus showed me what joy can be found in helping others. Soon afterwards I came to visit the Family in Croatia and felt the Lord calling me to leave my old life and stay here, dedicating myself to others. I felt a special love for the people here, and so I stayed in Croatia for 9 years.

What do you consider your greatest accomplishment during your time of service in Croatia?

I met a lot of people, and hope that I have made a difference in their life. I started "Clown therapy" after seeing the movie "Patch Adams" - I realized that I had a "clowning" talent, and that there was nobo-



dy doing it here in Croatia. So for years I visited various institutions weekly – senior citizens' homes, hospitals, handicapped centers. With time I also helped organize seminars and presentations of the project and different people from here joined me. realizing that this was helping them even more than the patients we were going to cheer up!

What happened to you during the past vear?

About one year ago, I was starting to get tired of giving to others, thinking that I needed a break from missionary service. I went back to Italy and tried helping my family and especially my brothers. I tried to go back to a normal life, but found out that it wasn't possible! The Lord kept calling me to reach out and help others! I kept meeting new people who needed His joy. A few times I helped the Family community in Sarajevo, Bosnia, then I went to help out with the earthquake victims in L'Aquila. Recently, the Lord gave me back the desire to return to full-time missionary service, and after praying and writing to different Family communities around the world. I have decided to go to Columbia. I'm presently working on

my visa and one of our communities there is waiting for me.

Why Columbia?

It's easy to go to a place where one can live an easy life. But there are not so many willing to go to difficult countries - and those are some of the most needy places. I'm going there because the Lord told me to ao.

Aren't vou afraid?

I'm afraid to disobey God. I'm more afraid to stay here and be out of the Lord's will, than to be in a dangerous country in the Lord's will. Because I know that if I obev. He will provide for me and protect me wherever I go. He promised to do it, so I take Him at His word.

Do you have a request, and a message for our readers?

My request to you all is that you pray for me, that I can do the Lord's will, and get the visa that I need soon. My message for everybody: this world needs love. If everyone would try to change only their part of the world, right where they are, this world would become a better place. So, instead of thinking about yourself, try thinking about others, even if you don't feel like it!

To all my friends: I will always have you in my heart, and will never forget about you! I will keep you in my prayers. My prayer for you is that you can get to know Jesus and His love the way that I know Him, because this will change your life. If you don't know how, just ask Jesus to help you! God bless you all! I love you!

The clown therapy project began on January 2nd this year, but we are planning an educational and training event for a larger audience of potential new volunteers – a weekend Clown therapy seminar on February 20 and 21st.



The yearly documentary of 2009 will soon be available in three languages – English, Italian and Croatian!

"Love for love" group in Cremona (Italy) is still going strong! They regularly organize fundraising events for the new volunteer Center we are planning to build. The construction will start in spring this year – a special thank-you to all who are willing to contribute in any way!

Coffee is essential to life in Croatia – anyone who has ever visited this country should know! With the beginning of this year came the invention "Morning coffee for the soul" – a weekly motivational email we send out to people who subscribe. The email message, containing meaningful stories, power point presentations, quotes or video clips is sent out every Monday morning, to help give subscribers positive energy and counsel to use in their daily life and interactions.

Trips are planned to Mostar area in Bosnia, and Karlovac with its surroundings, where we visit many needy families to help improve their quality of life. Humanitarian trips will be taken to Italy as well, bringing into Croatia necessary clothing, food, wheelchairs and other aides for the disabled.
